The organization SANGRAM (Sangathita Gramunnayan Karmasuchi) has completed its journey about 3.6 decades of its operation with different multidisciplinary activities in all districts of Barishal division. It has started its activities from Pathorghata upazila of Barguna district. Gradually it has extended the activities to upwards and covered the districts Barguna, Patuakhali, Bhola, Perojpur, Jhalokathi and Barisal. This wide range of area places main focus on microfinance associated with livelihood, non-formal and skilled education, Water Supply and Sanitation, Disaster Management, Climate Change and Adaptation and some interventions with Persons with Disabilities. SANGRAM has been serving with 388839 beneficiaries providing necessary services like microfinance, livelihoods, water supply and sanitation, skilled development training, support for climate change and adaptation etc. The organization has been running with 50 permanent branches in different disadvantaged location of 6 districts as though it can be responsive to the community during pre and post-crisis moments aiming at reaching services at the doors of affected community.

There is a high crisis of NGO funding for last three years. Not only SANGRAM all NGOs have been suffering from fund crisis irrespective of national and international. Introduction

SANGRAM is a non-government developmental organization established in 1985. SANGRAM started its activities from Pathoghata Upazilla of Barguna district adjacent to the Bay of Bengal. Day to day SANGRAM has extended its periphery and now all districts of Barisal division has included in its outreach. Coastal zone of Bangladesh occupies one third area of total land area. This area contains 19 districts, 147 upazila, 1351 unions, 70 pouroshova, 743 wards, 14636 mouza and 17618 villages. Total population of this area 3 crores and 50 lakhs (35 millions) and the area is 47,201 Sq. kms. It has been working for long 34 years and able to make substantive development of 9 lakhs socio-economically back footed people in 30 upazilla of Barguna, Perojpur, Jhalokhathi, Patuakhali, Barisal and Bhola districts. SANGRAM believes that there is a sufficient capacity is in cryptic position within the human being that can be make free vulnerable community from the ironic band of helpless and in humanitarian conditions and for that peoples participation is indispensable in development process. Due to the present socio-economic structure poor people are encompassed by the poverty circle even they become victim of social injustice. Due to the excluding trend of poor people from the main stream of development their spiritual power always remain unrevealed.

Background

Basically SANGRAM works in coastal area. Naturally peoples of this area are the victim of all types of disaster. Due to worse communication, threatened marine livelihoods and continuous disaster prone area the lives of the people of this area is separate than the normal livelihoods of other area. Hence the people of this area are neglected, deprived and

poverty sick. There is a great possibility earning sources from the Bay of Bengal, on the other hand incessant disaster in season and out of season has distressed the livelihoods of the people seriously. Landlessness, social conflict, insufficient economic support, weak law and order situation, marine robbers, lack of work, insufficient sanitary situation make extreme vulnerable the livelihoods of this area. Maximum people of this area depend on marine resources. Fishing in the sea and fish culture is the main profession of the people. Fishermen are being poor for the decrement trend of fishing and fish farming. More salinity has disrupted the normal situation of agriculture. Moreover cyclone, flash flood, irregular and frequent natural disaster seize the lives of the people. Famine breaks out in this area during the month of July-September. SANGRAM has been working for awareness development aiming to promote positive change of target people, assist people for decision making, how to start and continue something for the betterment of their lives. Such changes bring disadvantaged community in the main stream of development and thus they learn to represent community towards the substantive development. SANGRAM hopes economic development of the community emphasizing the importance of empowerment.

SANGRAM has three types of organizational structure like a General Body; it is the supreme authority of the organization. The group members of the areas select members of the supreme body. Out of it the members of the General body

select a 7 (seven) member's Executive Committee for a term of two years for executing its programs as well as policy making. Director with its modest staffs are responsible for overall administration, management and execution of the project under the guidance of the Executive body.

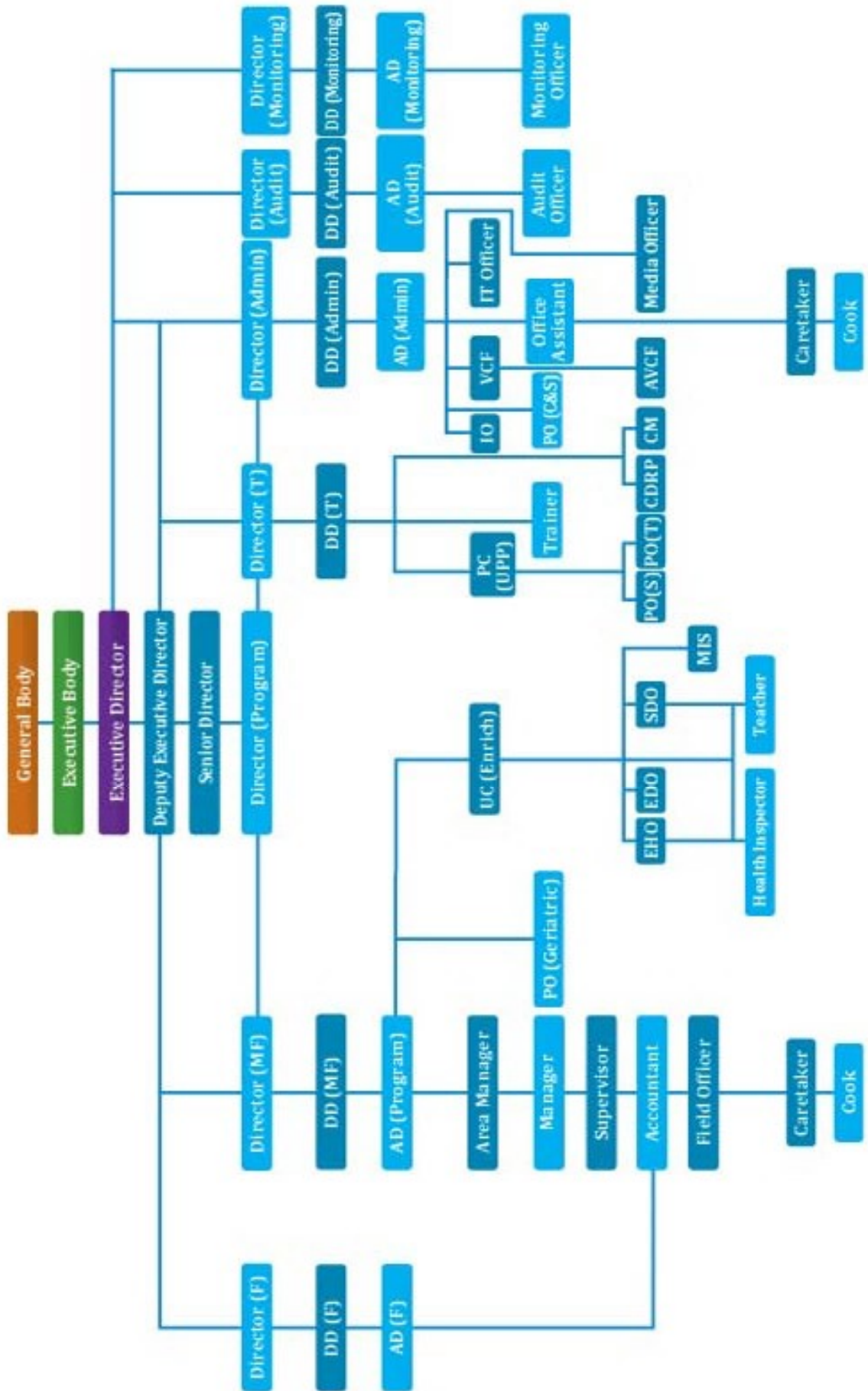

Enhancement of Resources and Increasing the
Capacities of Poor Households towards
Elimination of the Poverty



There is no controversy on the issue that the village development is an indispensable one for the development of country and the happiness of people. We are living for the sake of tedious labor of the village people. Not only for the natural and gloriousness but also for the socio-economic development and food security the role of village people in knew know bounds. The people of this country are innovative and laborious. They are extraordinarily innovative. If the people have proper patronization and direction they can make revolution in the field of microenterprise and small industries. Village people can change the feature of the country if they are owned accurately. If the people are assisted with technology, planning , monitoring and different kinds of production minimum one small industry can be formed in each village. If so, 90000 small industries can form in 90000 villages. 20 people can be employed in one small industry, as such 1 crore 80 lakhs people can be employed in above villages. As a result migration to the urban area will be decreased.

PKSF has started ENRICH project patronizing different livelihood related activities like education, health and nutrition, human resources development with economic support in large sense of poverty alleviation. Members of this project learn how to make best uses of local resources and their capacity. SANGRAM has

been implementing this program in Pathorghata sadar union of Pathorghata upazila and Dowatola union of Bamna upazila.

Goal: Active participation and capacity development especially of poor and ultra-poor people to enhance the status of health, education and nutrition in order to eradicate poverty.

Introduction

Human resource and organizational capacity building is the most significant issues for the development organizations working at national and local level especially in three disaster prone area of Bangladesh. These three areas have already been articulated as cyclone, flood and drought. Flood area also segregated in another event like flash flood. Flash flood is a most crucial disaster issue that happens every year in north and north-eastern area of the country. Thousands of households are abruptly inundated and damaged within one or two days. Bangladesh is treated as seriously affected area of climate change in global consideration and the coastal belt of Bangladesh is the main victim of cyclone, salinity and storm surges. In connection to the risk reduction of different types of disasters and climate vulnerability the Government of Bangladesh, Donor Agencies and International Development Organizations (INGOs) have decided to build capacity of the NGOs who are working at grass-roots level. In this regard Oxfam Bangladesh has launched a project titled "Empowering Local National Humanitarian Actors (ELNAH)" in 9 disasters prone districts with 6 supporting partners like CODEC-Barguna and Patuakhali, Asory Foundation- Satkhira, POPI-Kishoreganj and Sunamgonj, DAM-Dhaka, MJSKS-Kurigram and SKS Foundation-Gaibanda and Sirajgonj.

In Barguna district seven Lead Actors are working under the guidance of supporting partner(SP) CODEC. These are SANGRAM, Sangkalpa Trust, NSS, Jago Nari, DOCAP, ANNEA and SAP-BD. Different important events those relate capacity build in connection to Disaster Management, Disaster Risk Reduction, Gender Mainstreaming, Advocacy work and Fund Raising have been being implementing by above 7 organization. Humanitarian Project Proposal writing in Emergency Response is the most important event for the capacity building of the organization in relation to fund raising. The responsibility of implementing this event has bestowed on Sangkalpa Trust, Pathorghata in Barguna district. This organization arranged

these training hiring two national level consultants for 25 NGO professionals from 13 local NGOs of Barguna district.

Activities performed at different level

1. Oxfam BD: Provided training to the senior staffs of Supporting Partner and Lead Partners on Cash Transfer Programming (CTP) from 1st module to 4th module during March – December 2018 by an International facilitator.

Provided training to the Supporting and Lead partners on Protection and Safe Programming by and international facilitator.

Arrange different meetings and workshops at Dhaka and field level with Supporting and Lead Partners.

2. CODEC: Arrange quarterly basis Lead Actors Coordination meetings at Patuakhali. Facilitate Lead Actors (LNHA) in terms of implementing different events they are assigned for. Attain in different trainings and workshops arranged by Local National Humanitarian Actors (LNHAs).
3. SANGRAM: There were considerable numbers of events bestowed on different LNHA. SANGRAM was engaged with ELNHA activities in 1st half of 2018. This organization has successfully implemented two events on World Humanitarian Day 2018 and

Volunteers training on DRR for CPP, FSCD and Red Crescent.

World Humanitarian Day 2018: World Humanitarian Day has not yet been decided to observe at national level by the government of Bangladesh. International NGOs and some national NGOs in Bangladesh has been observing this day from the last year as per decision of UN General Assembly. SANGRAM observed WHD 2018 on 19 October 2018 jointly with the office of Deputy Commissioner Barguna with 100 participants of different NGOs, Govt. Institutions and Educational Institutions, Journalists and members of Civil Society Organization. The discussion session was led by Deputy Commissioner Mr. Moklesur Rahman.

Volunteers Training: Volunteers of different organizations either government or NGOs worked as frontline soldiers during disasters. Two days formal training was arranged for the volunteers of Cyclone Preparedness Program (CPP), Red Crescent Society and Fire Services and Civil Defense (FSCD). 30 participants were trained for two days on DRR activities with the facilitation of the Officers of CPP and FSCD held on 25-26 October 2018.

Introduction

Drivers of humanitarian crises are changing dramatically day by day. Disaster risk and human sufferings has reached astounding levels. Impacts of climate change may cause the largest humanitarian stress in the years to come. The core humanitarian principles impartiality and neutrality is a constant challenge at present. On the other hand humanitarian funding is not proportionately distributed geographically. The World Humanitarian Summit was held in 23-24 May 2016 in Istanbul. The Grand Bargain has emerged from that summit to find out the funding gaps of humanitarian issues. 15 donors and 15 largest agencies has agreed to use funds in cash and market mechanisms and directing more funding to national and local organization. They have also agreed to the idea of localization model in order to form local leaderships who are the proper stakeholders of problem solution and conflict resolution. "Charter for Change (C4C)" the another initiative of some international NGOs has launched in July 2015 by CAFOD, Christian Aid, Dan Church Aid and ADESO, has now been signed by 29 INGOs along with Oxfam, Care and Islamic Relief and endorsed more than 125 national NGOs and networks round the world.

In Bangladesh the humanitarian architecture is currently dominated by international actor and there is a very little presence of local NGOs and CBOs though huge numbers national and local NGOs are available here. It was keenly observed that the local actors can easily demonstrate the planned activities faster than outsiders both qualitative and quantitative aspects with cost more cost effectiveness. Considering the present context 45 local and national NGOs decided to establish a platform named National Alliance for Humanitarian Actors, Bangladesh (NAHAB) on 26 January 2017 with the patronization of Shifting the Power (STP) Project lead by Christian Aid. The Department of Disaster Management of Bangladesh Government officially acknowledges NAHAB as a national platform of the Humanitarian Actors. An ad-hoc committee was formed with 11 Local/National NGOs across the

country. NAHAB is committed to establish 7 thematic area for effective localization in Bangladesh: 1. Information and Knowledge Management 2. Fostering better Coordination 3. Networking among humanitarian actors 4. Strengthening capacity for humanitarian actions 5. Resource Mobilization 6. Advocacy at all level 7. Working closely with Government.

Role of SANGRAM

This organization has been working as Executive Committee member of NAHAB from its nascent stage and selected as a district focal of Barguna district for effective implementation of NAHAB localization activities.

Commencement of NAHAB activities at Barguna: July 2018.

Activities accomplishment: Following activities were done to promote NAHAB localization model at Barguna district.

1. A meeting on localization activities held at SANGRAM Head Office in 19 July 2018 with participation of 30 NGO representatives from Barguna and Patuakhali district.
2. Barguna districts Disaster Risk Reduction Network (BDRRN) meeting held on 21 October 2018 at SANGRAM Head Office. BDRRN policy update initiative was taken in this meeting. Local, National and International NGOs are working in Barguna participated in this meeting.
3. Training on DM Act 2012 and SOD conducted in 10-11 December 2018 at SANGRAM Training Centre facilitated by DRRO Barguna and Director of host organization.
4. An Advocacy Workshop held in 13 December 2018 at SANGRAM Head Office facilitated by ADC (General) Barguna and Director SANGRAM.



Programme on Developing Lifestyles of Geriatric People



Background

Palli Karma-Sahayak Foundation (PKSF) was formed by the government of Bangladesh in 1990 aiming to promote socioeconomic status of rural livelihood providing financial and technical assistance through its partner NGOs round the country. PKSF has been applying bulk amount of activities in order to build capacity of its partners in connection to pragmatic implementation of different multidisciplinary project for the sake of developing grass-roots level socioeconomic condition. From the nascent stage of this government organization it has implemented huge number of project by its capacitated partner NGOs. Now PKSF is going to start a new project titled "Programme on Developing Lifestyles of Geriatric People in Society". SANGRAM is one of the veteran partners of PKSF. This non-government organization SANGRAM has selected to implement the aforementioned project in Pathorghata upazila of Barguna district.

The people who have crossed already 60 years, they are declared as Senior Citizen of the country in 2013. In this connection they are to get facilities on priority basis but it has not yet been possible to ensure indiscriminately. Needs are being increased with ages but on the other hand financial capabilities are decreased compared to aging even they are not prioritized in regards to have treatment facilities. Aged peoples are needed to accumulate in different programs from those they can be benefited as per their needs. SANGRAM has been trying to address the needs of aged people through this project. Government has taken some initiatives for its senior citizens of which aged allowance is more significant one. In this regard 3100000 aged people get Tk. 500/= per month each. But the peoples of remote area are being left to get this allowance. SANGRAM has started to implement this project with financial support of PKSF in Pathorghata and Bamna upazila of Barguna district.

2. Introduce old aged allowance, special savings and pension scheme for geriatric people.
3. Introduce Honor's for both geriatric people and their ideal children.
4. Introduce special credit and training for ultra-poor geriatric people.
5. Introduce geriatric care and making physio-therapist.
6. Special assistance for geriatric people.
7. Establish effective coordination between partner NGO and relevant government department.

The above 7 activities are segregated in to 26 specific activities and a time bound action plan was introduced for substantive programme implementation.

Programme expenditure

This program will be implemented by the joint venture activities of PSKSF and SANGRAM and the total expenditure will be borne by both. Construction of geriatric club is a vital point among the all activities. 80% of total expenditure of geriatric club will be borne by PKSF and the organization will bear rest 20%. Other expenditure of this programme will be borne equally by PKSF and SANGRAM.

Manpower

One senior official of SANGRAM is acting as a Focal Person who is responsible for supervising all activities of this programme on behalf of the organization. A Programme Organizer is appointed as a full time staff for field level activity implementation and he is accountable to the Focal Person for his responsibility.

Pathorghata Sadar union of Pathorghata Sadar upazila under Barguna district.

Geriatric Club

3 decimal lands have been donated by Mr. Chowdhury Mohammad Masum, Executive Director of this organization adjacent to the

Chowdhury Masum Agriculture Institute at Hatimpur village of Pathorghata sadar union for geriatric club. As the project is in nascent stage the building for this club has not yet been constructed. The building construction will be started immediately as per the design provided by PKSF.

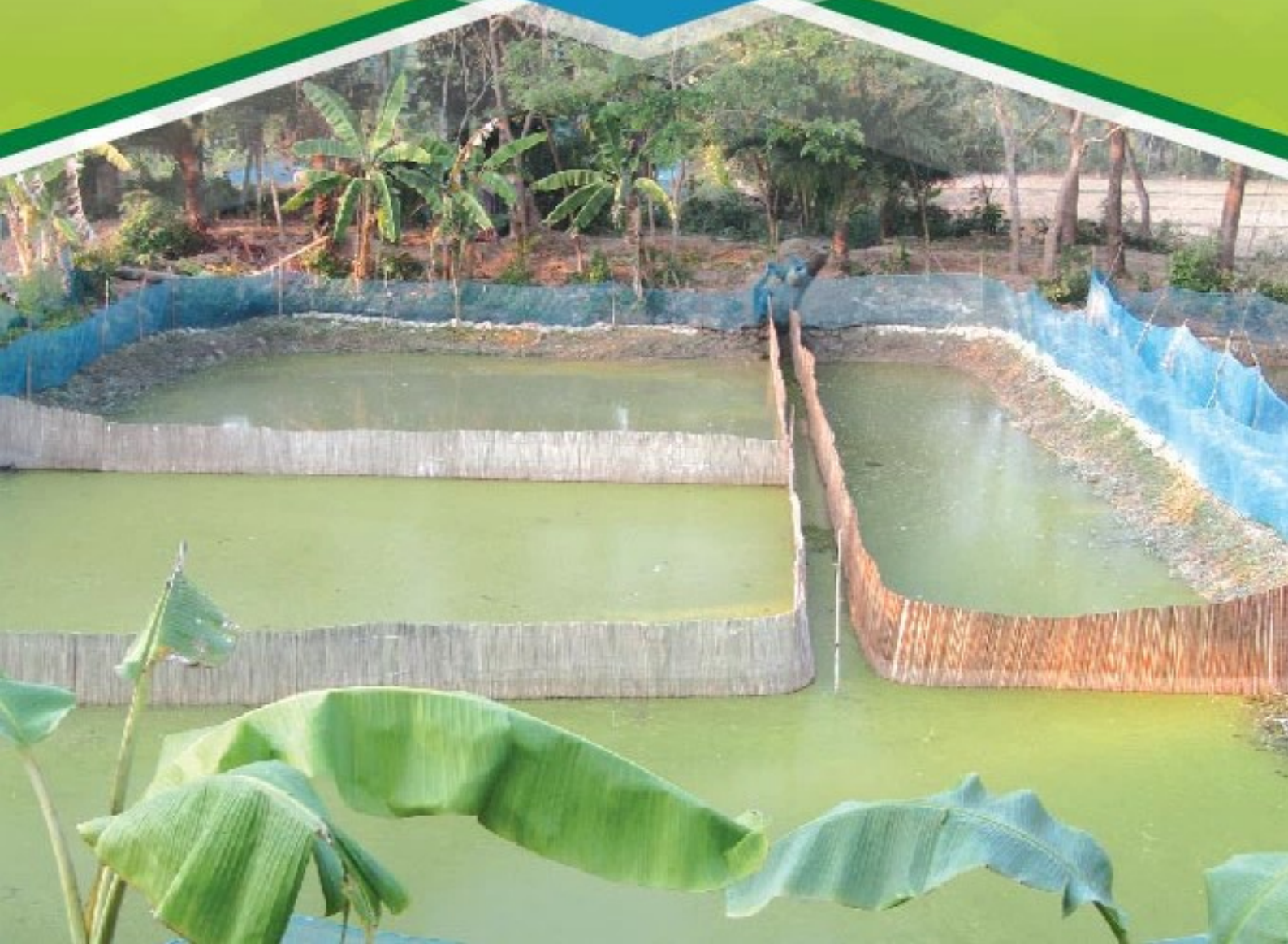

95% crabs are exported collected from natural sources and farming system. Normally hard shell and soft shell crabs are exported. 95% exported crabs are hard shelled. Only 2% crab lets are collected from nature of our exporting capacity and Bangladesh lose 7662 crores foreign currency every year. Moreover 2.5-3.0 million peoples are left unemployed.

Crab culture is essentially needed to be adapt with our income generation confronting adverse situation of Climate Change. It is an adaptive income generating activity in critical environmental situation but we are to search international markets of crab. SANGRAM has started crab fattening and trying to make hatchery with the financial and technical support of IFAD and PKSf aiming to enhance income generation and

The continuation of providing support remains up to second time on the basis of their performance.

Strength of these three pillars makes food stability. The prerequisite of food security are increase food production, employment creation and enhance income generation. Hunger is the full time companion of ultra-poor. Hunger degenerate the spiritual power of human being especially poor and ultra-poor.

Food security 2012 Bangladesh (Ujjibito) has started from 2013. An MOU was signed between government of Bangladesh and European Union on 28/5/2013. This project has been jointly executing by PKSF(Palli Karma Sahayak Foundation) and LGED(Local Government and Engineering Department). This project contains two main components and these are 1. Cash for Work(CFW) and 2. Skill, Capacity and Awareness raising activities. Here LGED for CFW and PKSF are responsible for implementing skill, capacity and awareness raising activities. Free of Cost Eye Care and Treatment



Disability of eyes can be protected or cured if it can be treated initially, e. g Cataract operation, Terrarium can be done easily in primary stage. Night blind disease can be protected using Vitamin-A. Cornea transplantation can save a man from blindness. Blindness affects seriously within rural people only due to lack of awareness. If there is no primary initiative someone may lost his/her eye sight for ever. Actually SANGRAM have a look to the community in terms of eye care especially for old aged persons. 90% of blindness people are in developing countries. Most of the people in village level and do not have any idea that their eye treatment is not very difficult and costly but it is more easy and available to their doors. The brief of eye care support of the organization is mentioned below:

1. Details of Microcredit

Credit is the core program of SANGRAM of which main activity is group formation, savings accumulations and providing credit to the beneficiaries those who are involved with different IGAs. SANGRAM has been working with this activity from 1989 forming groups with the association of socially deprived, back footed, distressed, illiterate men and women. The objective of the programme is to improve socio-

economic conditions, status of Income Generating Activities (IGAs) of the concerned peoples. The groups are involved in credit programme that comprised of 25-30 members and male-female is in separate groups headed by two group leaders with the designation of President and Secretary. The groups are popularly termed as Samiti.

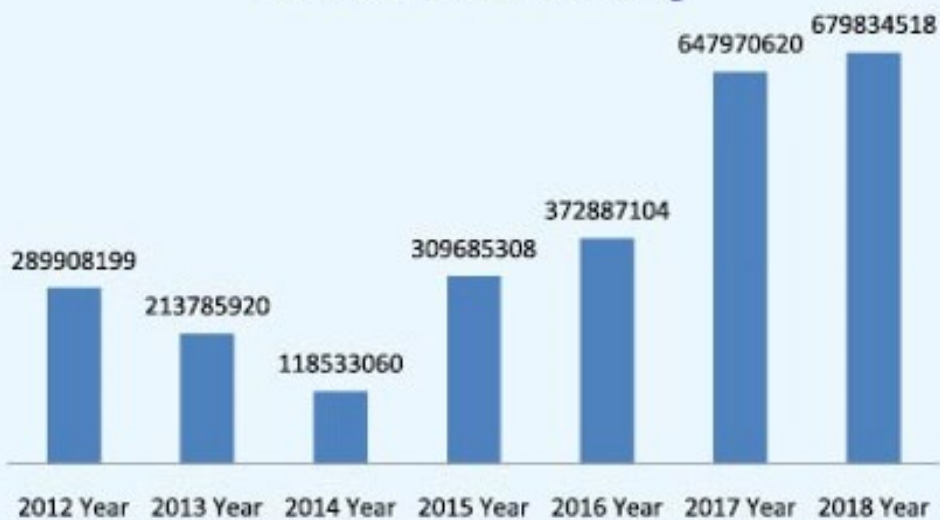


Loan Distribution to a woman Entrepreneur

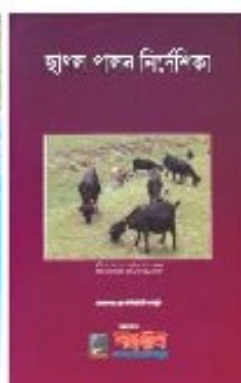
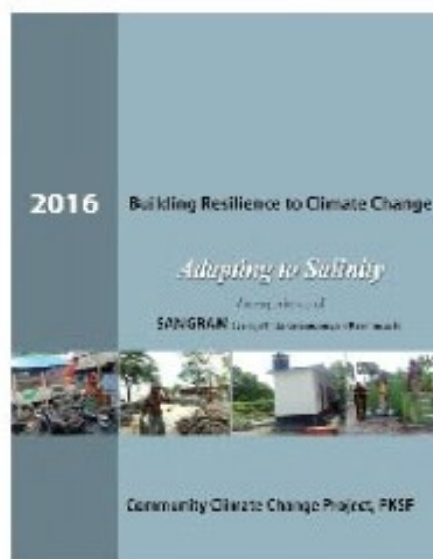
The publication cell publishes Newsletter named SANGRAM BARTA regularly and also

Case Study

SANGRAM Response to Forcibly Displaced Rohingya People from Myanmar to Bangladesh Ukhya Cox's Bazaar

SANGRAM provided some humanitarian assistance to distressed Rohingya people at Tasmiar Gola village of Ukhya upazila under Cox's Bazaar district. One day salary of all staffs of the organization Tk. 150000.00 and from organization Tk. 100000.00 was given for Rohingya assistance. Our partner organization Al-Raji Hospital at Dhaka along with its sister concerns Padma Group, General Pharmaceutical and Bio-Pharma participated with their efforts. These organizations participated with Tk. 1050000.00 in our Rohingya mission. Four members from Sangram and a team of physicians from Al-Raji Hospital that comprised of 6 members actively

participated in this emergency mission. Safe water, dry food, baby food, emergency treatment, medicines, 20 sanitary latrines and Tk. 100000.00 cash provided to the Rohingya people prioritized women and children. The mission worked there from 13 to 15 September 2017. One of our partner organization named "Social Assistance and Rehabilitation for Physically Vulnerable (SARPV)" working in Ukhya, Cox's Bazaar through which we provided 20 sanitary latrines as a part of our sanitary activities in Rohingya saturated area. SANGRAM has a plan to start long term activities



Best Micro Entrepreneurship Award in Agriculture-9th



Mr. Samed Fakir selected as the best micro entrepreneur in agriculture in the 9th Micro entrepreneur award which is arranged by the Citi Foundation (a sister concern of Citi Group) and CDF. Samed Fakir is from Amkhola village of Taltoli upozila in Barguna district. He took initiative with only five thousands taka as loan from an NGO Named SANGRAM and at present he is host in himself to lead his life and livelihood and became a glorious example for others as a good entrepreneur.

On 14th June at Sonargaon Hotel in Dhaka Samed Fakir has received a prestigious crest from Honorable State Minister, Planning & Finance Ministry and received a cheque of Tk. 350000 from the Governor of Bangladesh Bank, Dr. Atiur Rahman.

In an immediate repercussion Samed Fakir said that, 'I started my agricultural works with five thousands taka only but at present my agricultural goods are very popular within the community.'

The entrepreneur Samed Fakir is the eldest among the six siblings. His father died while he was the students of class VIII. At that time he left his education and started to buying shrimp lets from the local collectors and used to sell them in Khulna area. With his very small income it was very tough for him to maintain his family. Later he started to rear duck. Next year he excavated a pond and start to fish

farming. He gained a little profit from this and later he hewed 5 decimal lands and start fish farming and duck rearing. He became a member of SANGRAM microfinance program in the year of 2006. First time he received loan of Tk. 5000 and second time he received loan of Tk. 30000. In the year 2007 the devastating cyclone Sidr destroyed his continues success and again SANGRAM has provided 150,000 taka as RESCUE Loan (Loan provided for rehabilitation after Sidr). With a great hope Samed Fakir again started his fish cultivation and cultivating different other vegetables like; Sunflower, Maize etc. In that year he got profit about Tk. 160,000. After this he never needed to look back. Later he gradually increased his amount of loan for hewed pond and implanting 100 coconut trees. This year he has taken Tk. 250,000 as loan. He has cultivated shrimp, carp fish, salmon, silver carp, koi etc. Along with this he has also cultivated different vegetables, paddy, chili, sunflower etc. Presently he is owning the assets of about Tk. 2524000. In this regard the chief of microfinance of SANGRAM has said that, 'Samed Fakir is a creative entrepreneur, along with crop and fish cultivation, cow rearing, fruit production, vermin compost, produce local coconut oil, sunflower oil with effective market linkage. He has deployed 13 workers on different IGAs in his integrated farms.

Best Micro Entrepreneurship Award in Agriculture-13th



Mr. Azizul Haque Sikdar achieved the 3rd position of Best Micro entrepreneurship in agriculture in the 13th Micro entrepreneur award which is arranged by the Citi Foundation (a sister concern of Citi Group) and Sajeda Foundation. He is from Alir Bandar village of Taltali upazila in Barguna district.

Mr. Azizul Haque Sikdar is a heroic freedom fighter of Bangladesh. He was directly engaged with liberation war in 1971. Due to some social and family barrier he could not cross education level SSC. He had a special curiosity to fish farming from his boyhood inherited from his father. After sudden demise of his father he steered the activity of fish farming full swing with a vast area of land surrounding his house. He received a considerable number of training from upazila and district fisheries offices as well as Danish International Development Agency (DANIDA). His fish farming was not in good condition during year of 2000 to 2006. Again he started his fish farming in 2007 after super cyclone-2007 taking 100000.00 Tk. loan from SANGRAM Koroibaria Branch. 25 big ponds and 2-3 Kilometers canal were included in his mega farm. One pond is especially particular for brood fishes of all individual species of fish. Requisite technologies and skill manpower are in place for collecting eggs from brood fish and hatching. At first hatchlings are taken in nursery ponds and then transferred to other ponds. After being 6 -7 inches long the fingerlings are

transferred to another large ponds and canals. He produces fingerlings of different types of endangered fresh water species like local Cat fish, Vetki, Boal, Aeyr, Chital, Salmon, Katla etc and sell to his neighboring peoples. He also produces Pangash fish in his ponds and sells in local growth centers.

12 peoples are working in his farm. 30-40 laborers are required during ponds preparation. Many of his neighbors started fish farming following Azizul Haque Sikdar. They buy fish fry from him and cultivate in their own canals and ponds. Different organizations use his farm as a training institution. Mr. Aziz has mini fish-feed producing mills. He collects dry fish during winter season and prepares fish-feeds in his own mills. His farm is more profitable than others due to the feed preparation in his own arrangement. Demand of fishes of Sikders farm is too high. Peoples buy huge amount of fish during different ceremony and parties from his farm. Deputy Commissioners of Barguna and the officials of other offices visited his farms several times and prized him as recognition of his work. Considering the security of his wealth and life former Deputy Commissioner gave him a gun. Every year he profits 20-30 Lakhs money from his farm. He profits more money from the land surrounding his farms through vegetable and fruit gardening especially coconut. His yearly profit is 25%-30% of his total investment.

Presently his current loan is 400000/- Tk. from Sangram NGO and he does not have any loan from other organization besides this. Day by day he is promoting his investment in his farms and adds updated technologies on fish farming in his farm. There is a great possibility of earning crores of money from this farm carrying creating employment of 50-60 peoples. All types of species of fish in one farm is a rare incident and Mr. Azizul Haque Sikdar has able to draw the attention of all level people

Bangladesh Adolescents Summit 2018



District level competition for Adolescents Summit 2018

Bangladesh Adolescents Summit 2018 was held in Dhaka with patronization of Palli Karma-Sahayak Foundation (PKSF) under its Cultural and Sports Program aiming to bloom mental development of adolescents in remote and disadvantaged area of Bangladesh for forming future leaderships. Adolescents were shortlisted to attain in summit at Dhaka through the competition of different level of education institutions and upazila.

Interested education institutions selected students who possess extra curriculum in addition to merit, ethics and leadership quality. 10 students were selected from different institutions through competitive test in consideration to above curriculum to attain at upazila level. It was decided with the discussion of School Management Committee (SMC)

members and teachers of respective schools. Students of class IX and X from school/madrasha level class XI and XII from college level were included in this competitive arrangement.

Four area were considered as selection criteria. These are 1. Article/Creative writing competition 2. Intelligence Quotient (IQ) competition 3. Leaderships Quality and 4. Adolescents achievement. Methods were followed like written test, speech and MCQ for proper selection. One evaluation team was formed in each Upazila for final selection at Upazila level. 10 competitors were selected from each Upazila through this team. Crest of honor, certificate and Yes Card were provided to each of 10 selected competitors.

60 participants attend in district level competition at Barguna Adarsha Secondary Girls School 10 from each upazila on 25 July 2018. 10 adolescents both boys and girls were finally selected from district level competition. A day long competition was held on article writing, IQ test and mathematical skill as selection methods. In addition to these extempore speech and adolescents achievement competition was held in the same platform.

National level Bangladesh Adolescents Summit 2018 was held in Dhaka on 25 October 2018 at Bangabandhu International Conference Hall.

Handicrafts Promote Livelihoods of RANKHAIN Families

Rakhain is a tribal community lives in southern part of Bangladesh. Once upon a time they were dominated in two coastal districts Barguna and Patuakhali. The name of places in the name of the people of this community reveals their dominations in this area earlier, e.g. Khepupara, Kalapara, Satonpara, Monekhpapara, Kapravanga, Boroankujanpara etc. Now this community has been cornered in three upazila of Barguna and Patuakhali district of which Barguna sadar and Taltoli in Barguna district and Kalapara in Patuakhali district. Total number of population is 6015 of which in Barguna district 1945 and Patuakhali district 4070 within the households 655 and 1330. SANGRAM (Sangathita Gramunnayan Karmasuchi) has been working with Rakhain Community in both districts for long 16 years. This organization has covered 140 families in two districts by three branches like Taltoli and Loupara in Barguna and Kalapara in Patuakhali district providing microfinance support and other livelihood issues. As of October 2018 this NGO has provided credit Tk. 3500000/= to 140 Rakhain members. All members from this community are female. They produce handicraft items using bamboo and fabrics by handlooms. The tourist point Kuakata is nearer to this tribal community. Tourist market Kuakata is the main selling point of Rakhain produced handicraft items. They produce Shirt Piece,

Shawl, Lungi and Shari by handlooms and other handicraft items using bamboo and cane.

17% of total population in Bangladesh is ultra-poor and the Rankhain population is socioeconomically placed within this poverty threshold. Employment creation can play a good role in terms of developing livelihood of such gigantic number of people. Involvement of ultra-poor people with training can be a positive indicator for self-employment. Aiming to address this indicator, training provided to 50 ultra-poor members through UPP-Ujjibito Project on bamboo made handicrafts and handlooms operation at Kabiraj Para village of Taltoli upazila. Out of these 50 members, 42 are from the tribal community named Rakhain. This training program was held at Kabiraj Para cyclone shelter in presence of NGO and community leaders.

This training program was held with financial and technical assistance of European Union (EU) and Palli Karma-Sahayak Foundation (PKSF). The aim of this training was to enhance the socioeconomic status of ultra-poor Rankhain families and female headed families for the sake of developing their lives and livelihood. The output of this training is, participants will make a positive change in their life and livelihood using the knowledge achieved from this platform of training through engaging themselves with adaptive income generating activities that will accelerate a positive impact on their family lives.

About 350 families of this poverty sick area of Rankhain community led their lives and livelihoods producing these bamboos made handicrafts and handlooms producing good and selling in local markets. Females are mostly engaged with this profession that makes their family well to do. There is an intensive communication between material providers and Rankhain community. The people of Rankhain community are early riser. They are engaged with their bamboo and cane produced handicrafts activities from very early of every morning. They have find out the way of income sitting in the houses with low capital. There is good possibility of produced goods of this back footed tribal community but they need sufficient support. Support of NGOs is very insufficient as per need. Support for this extinct community should be in holistic approach.
