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The Coastal zone of Bangladesh occupies one-third area of the total land area. This area contains 19 districts, 147 Upazila, 1351 unions, 70 pouroshova, 743 wards, 14636 mouza, and 17618 villages. This area's total population is three crores and 50 lakhs (35 million), and the site is 47,201 Sq. Km. It has been working for long 34 years and able to make substantive development of 9 lakhs socio-economically back footed people in 30 Upazila of Barguna, Perojpur, Jhalokhathi, Patuakhali, Barisal, and Bhola districts. SANGRAM believes that a sufficient capacity is in a cryptic position within the human being that can be made free of vulnerable communities from the ironic band of helplessness and humanitarian conditions.

Due to the present socio-economic structure, poor people are encompassed by the poverty circle even though they become victims of social injustice. The excluding trend of poor people from the mainstream of developing their spiritual power always remains unrevealed.

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Background

SANGRAM works in the coastal area. Naturally, peoples of this area are the victim of all types of Due to worse communication, disasters. threatened marine livelihoods, and continuous disaster-prone areas, the lives of this area's people are separate from other areas' normal livelihoods. Hence the people of this area are neglected, deprived, and poverty sick. There is an excellent possibility of earning sources from the Bay of Bengal, on the other hand, continuous disaster in season and out of season has distressed the livelihoods of the people seriously. Landlessness, social conflict. insufficient economic support, weak law and order situation, marine robbers, lack of work, inadequate sanitary condition make extremely vulnerable the livelihoods of this area. Maximum people of this area depend on marine resources. Fishing in the sea and fish culture is the primary profession of the people. Fishers are being poor

for the decrement trend of fishing and fish farming. More salinity has disrupted the usual situation of agriculture.

Moreover, cyclones, flash floods, irregular and frequent natural disasters seize the lives of the people. Famine breaks out in this area during the month of July-September. SANGRAM has been working for awareness development, aiming to promote a positive change of target people, assist people for decision-making, start and continue something for the betterment of Such changes brina their lives. disadvantaged community into the mainstream of development, and thus they learn to represent the community towards substantive effect. SANGRAM hopes economic development of the community, emphasizing the importance of empowerment.

Education program

Education program started under ENRICH to stop dropping out at the primary level. This program goes with some education centers located in two unions. 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Enthusiastic Member Rehabilitation

Twenty beggars have been rehabilitated, 12 in Patharghata and 6 in Dowatala union. Each person was given a grant Tk. 1,00,000 (one lakh) and a total grant Tk. 20,00,000 (twenty lakhs). Through grants, they have achieved financial and moral success adopting IGA based on their skills. All these successful people are called enthusiastic members. Six are alive, six have died in the Patharghata union, and eight are alive in the Dowatala union.

Special Savings Activities

For the families of ENRICH Union, who have children with disabilities or women-headed families, special savings activities have been introduced to support them financially. The members of these families will deposit the amount of money from their income as a bank for a certain period. The exact amount of money is provided from the ENRICH project at the end of the term. In Pathorghata Union, 45 members were given a special grant of Tk. 887488.00.

Sanitation Activities

ENRICH has been working with sanitation in Patharghata and Dowatala union from its nascent stage. Health workers and social development officers do software and hardware activities. Sanitation activity is comprised of the following two sub-activities.



1. Sanitary Latrine installation: A survey was conducted to identify open and unhygienic latrines in Patharghata and Dowaltala union. Awareness-raising activity was introduced in well-being families, and five rings with one slab were provided to low-income families. Progress at a glance is mentioned below.

Community latrine: No-59, family coverage-3540; Ring slab latrine-495, family coverage-495, beneficiaries-2504; HHs level latrine installation-200, Family coverage-200, Beneficiaries-915.

2. Water Points installation: It is impossible to install tube well in Patharghata and Dowatala union. Different types of water points were installed as follows:

ENRICH Homes

ENRICH homes attempt to make people economically self-reliant in remote areas by making maximum use of homestead land. The house owner benefits financially by using the planned amount of land available in these houses. Meets the demand of one's own family for vegetables, the monthly income is also seven to nine thousand takas. Activities are undertaken as follows:

The number of ENRICH homes: 146 of which 100 by grants and 46 by the beneficiaries through motivation.

Agriculture with Vermicompost

Earthworms are one of the most beneficial natural small animals. Vermicompost is produced by villagers using particular species of earthworms. This fertilizer contains a lot of food material for plants. Through ENRICH program, a considerable number of compost farmers have been developed. All these farmers have been trained and given grants, following agriculture products produced using vermicompost.

The youth cleans markets, built bridges over the canal, planted palm seeds on both sides of the road, and are taking creative initiatives. There are 46 youth committees in Pathorghata and Dowatala union, including 300 female and 690 male members. The training was provided to 640 persons, male 487 and female 153.

Additional income can be earned by cultivating Basak leaves in the fenced land or at the border of the houses and roads. Basak leaf cultivation does not require much care or fertilizer.

Pharmaceutical companies Square Pharmaceutical and The ACME Laboratories Ltd. buy raw leaves from the local level at Tk. 40 per kg. A leaf dryer machine was set for drying Basak leaves. The results of Basak leaves cultivation are mentioned below.

Promotion of Human Rights for the Persons with Disability in Bangladesh

(PHRPBD)



Health Care Service provided by MBBS doctor at Mental Health Care Center In order to ensure the overall development of the country integrating persons with disabilities into development. It is essential to create a conducive environment and enhance their capabilities. In addition, if we are committed to providing the just needs of persons with disabilities. Persons with disabilities can change their situation by striving to meet them independently. With this conviction, "Promotion of Human Rights of Persons with Disability in Bangladesh (PHRPBD)" has been implemented by the local organizations SANGRAM (Sangathita Gramunnyan Karmasuchi) in collaboration with the Center for Disability in Development (CDD) since 2010. This project aims to improve the quality of life by establishing the rights of persons with disabilities in Bangladesh. Under this project, 10 Self-Help groups and one apex body with 129 persons with disabilities have been formed in Nilgani, Baliatli, and Mithagani Unions of Kalapara Upazila. The overall achievement of this project is highlighted in the 2021 Annual Report.

The goal of the project: Improve the quality of life by establishing the rights of persons with disabilities in Bangladesh

The objective of the project

In Kalapara Upazila, the government, development agencies, and organizations of persons with disabilities and civil society in collaboration with persons with disabilities to form sustainable groups and organize them and develop leadership among them to establish rights as well as improve the quality of life of persons with disabilities transforming disability issues into an integrated development.

The main focus of the project

Through the project, the participation of persons with disabilities is to form an organization, one of which is made up of women with disabilities. Each group has at least 10 to 20 members and has been actively considered to ensure the participation of people with all types of

disabilities. Various steps have been taken to enhance the members' skills before and after forming co-organizations, such as providing need-based training, exchanging visits, acquiring knowledge through regular discussions at the party level, etc. The project also forms an apex body that conducts advocacy activities at the policy-making level on the rights of persons with disabilities. Dialogue and exchange meetings are being organized at the national level to create awareness in the policy-making community about the rights of persons with disabilities under this project, and the disabled representatives of the apex body are actively participating. The project includes rehabilitation services (Therapeutic) and referral services for persons with disabilities. At the same time, a series of ear and eye examination camps are being conducted to identify the visually impaired and provide necessary services to them. Through this project, only those with special needs are provided with minimal assistive devices. In addition, the project engages the community and people with disabilities in disaster risk reduction activities. It enhances the empowerment of the most vulnerable people with disabilities, such as how disability-friendly disaster risk reduction activities can contribute to the development of education and health in the community as a whole.

Work area

129 persons with disabilities and their families from 18 villages of Nilganj, Baliatli, and Mithaganj Unions of Kalapara Upazila of Patuakhali district.

Apex body: An Apex Body has been formed with two members from each of the ten Self-Help groups of the project. Apex Body contains 11 females, nine males, and 20 in total. The Apex Body members are working diligently to realize the rights of the members of the Self-Help group and the attainment of various benefits at the governmental and non-governmental levels.

A significant part of the PHRPBD project in the period up to 31 December 2021 at a glance: VSLA: VSL Approach is an opportunity for the participating poor (disabled persons) who are not covered by microcredit or are deprived of access to microcredit to save and benefit from those savings. The activities of this approach are conducted in a cycle of one year, and at the end of the year, its members share the total savings and dividends according to their time. The VSL approach is well-organized, more transparent, and more accountable so that even the less educated and less aware members can easily understand and rely on this method. People with disabilities in the PHRPBD project by following this method 1. Golap Nari Disabled Self-Help group, 2. Ashar Alo Disabled Self-Help group, 3. Banaful Disabled Self-Help group, 4. Bara Baliatali Disabled Self-Help group 5. Mithagani Disabled Self-Help group, 6. Ekta Disabled Self-Help group. The

number of members associated with VSL is 86. The price per share is 20 Taka. The number of members purchasing shares is 30. The amount of money saved in the savings fund is 57920 Taka. 15 borrowing members. Loan disbursement 43,400. Installment collection 26955. 18 thousand 200 Taka as loan. The total profit amount is 6400 Taka. So far, the withdrawal of shares has been Tk. 34,800.

IGA: The PHRPBD project partners have taken up livelihood activities to develop themselves as successful income earners through independent income. income-generating activities of persons with disabilities are somewhat different and different from the traditional ones. Moreover, there are differences in implementing income-generating activities according to the type of disability. Sangram, in collaboration with CDD, has provided a grant of Tk. 18,00,000 (Eighteen lakh taka) to facilitate the income-generating activities of the project members of PHRPBD. This money has been disbursed as ten separate banks of self-organization. The current assets of 129 members have been profiled at the outset to track progress through the implementation of livelihood activities. In addition, FGDs have been conducted to select suitable IGAs for persons with disabilities in the region, and interviews have been conducted with the local government and stakeholders at the public-private level. The potential IGA requirements of each member have since been determined. All the members have been imparted two days of training by conducting seven courses on assigned IGA. An IGA policy and a business plan have been developed to implement IGA successfully. Orientation is provided to make it easier to follow these guidelines and enable self-organization members to manage their accounts. Later, the members of

the self-organization started IGA with their own decision. Sangram and CDD helped.

Network with public-private organizations: One of the activities of this project is to increase participation in disability benefits by liaising with governmental and non-governmental organizations. In light of this, members of the PHRPBD project have recruited eight persons with a disability through communication. Received a grant from Social Services (Hafez Milan 10000). Following the government's decision, nine people have been included in the assistance of the fishermen during the blockade. Khas land of a person has been recovered.

Local government and other advocacy: Persons with disabilities have the right to several benefits in light of the Rights and Protection Act. In light of the local government and other organizations, through advocacy, have been able to include 11 members of the standing committee of the union council in the committee. Additional Standing Committee on Disability has been formed in 2 Unions through discussions and action taken with Union Parishads. community clinic committee has five members. Two people have been included in the school committee. One has been included in the Committee for Prevention of Violence against Women and Children. The lgsp-2 committee has two members. Disaster Management Committee has two members. As a result of advocacy in the Union Parishad, the Union Parishad has allocated a Tk. 11 lakh 25 thousand for the disability sector. Seven lakh 63 thousand takas has been spent among the disabled people from the allocation.

Contact the interested support provider: When the legal aid provider was contacted to develop persons with disabilities in this project, four persons received assistance for obtaining legal aid. At Kalapara Health Complex, 11 people got help from OCC to solve the problem. Two people got help through the police station. Assistance in child abuse has been found.

Integrated Community Clinic: There are no ramps in the buildings of community clinics in Kalapara. Persons with disabilities do not have latrines. They are also deprived of services due to some other limitations. With this in mind, the Kankunipara Community Clinic has been transformed into an integrated community clinic with minor modifications, subject to liaison with the Health Department and the Clinic Committee. As a result, 31 Self-Help group disabled patients and 158 non- Self-Help group disabled patients have been covered.

Receive assistance by setting up linkages in various private organizations: Apex Body, partner NGOs have organized numerous workshops, lobbying for advocacy, and Self-Help group has benefited from the project's benefits. This includes two cut lip operations: cataract surgery and lens placement of 3 persons. Outside the



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project, 89 people have received relief materials from the government and NGOs. 4 Self-Help group members received 11 goats as donations. Eight members received a grant of one lakh four thousand takas for purchasing fish and ingredients. Five members received five sewing machines. A female member received three bundles of tin through the rich.

Inclusion in the social safety net program: Members of the PHRPBD project lobbied for the disadvantaged population to receive assistance from the government's social safety net program. As a result, 49 people have been registered with disability certificate, and the allowance covers 66, four are covered under widow allowance, eight are covered under geriatric allowance, 1 includes artist allowance, five people included in the scholarship, 2 for maternity allowance, and 15 people included in the VGD card.

Inclusion in GO/ NGO training: 75 people have been trained by various NGOs through self-organization and Apex Body members.

Twenty people have received technical training on child care for the disabled. Twenty people received sewing training. Seven people have received goat rearing training. Eleven people received training on cattle rearing, and 11 people received training on fish farming.

Inclusion of children with disabilities in education: 52 children with disabilities have been admitted to the school, and 12 of them have been included in the education stipend.

Referrals: Services have been confirmed by referring 62 critically ill persons to Patuakhali Disability Relief Center, Barisal Medical College Hospital.

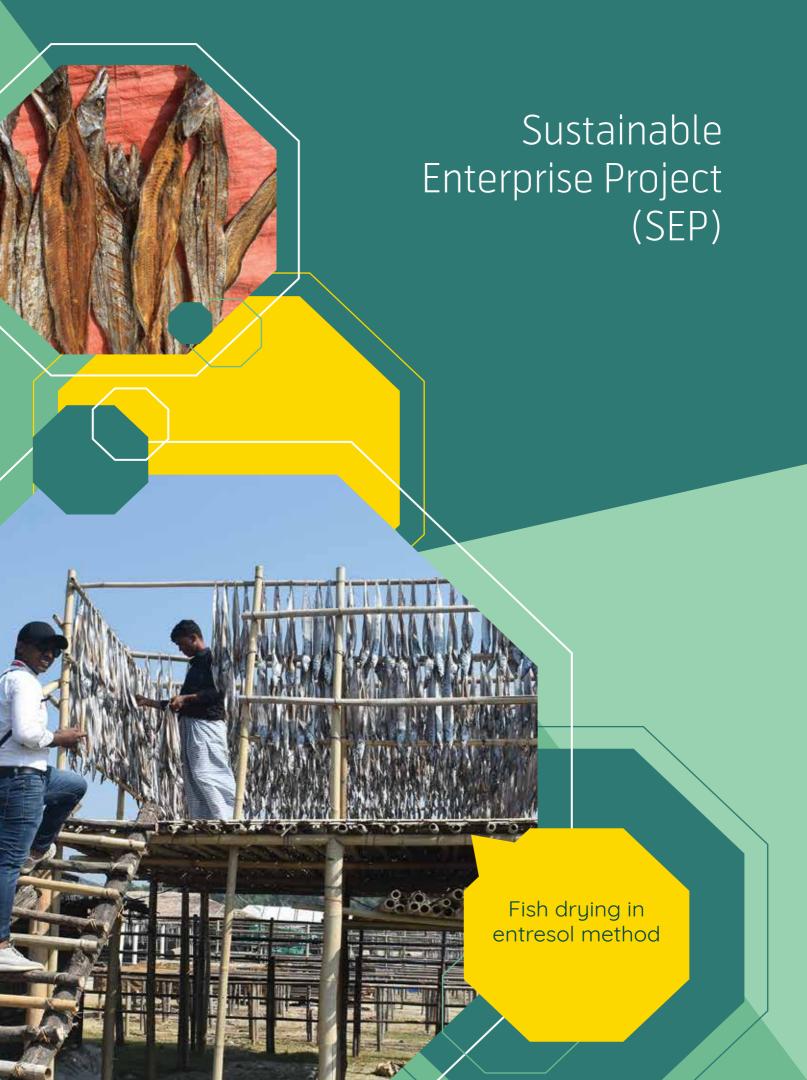
To facilitate the movement of persons with disabilities in schools and other places: A total of ten ramps have been made in the education institutions, these are East Madhukhali Government Primary School, West Madhukhali Government Primary School, Bara Baliatali Government Primary School, Digar Baliatali Government Primary School, Kankunipara Government Primary School, Vaidyapara Government Primary School, Omedpur Dakhil Madrasa, Heed Bangla Shishu Vidyalaya. , Melapara Adarsh Gram and Nilganj Union Parishad in small size.

Placing social maps, billboards, pillars, and flags for disaster warning: In front of Baliatali Union Parishad, two social maps have been set up at Baliatali Union, Pakhimara Bazar Nilganj Union. A billboard has been erected on the south bank of the Baliatali ferry terminal. Besides, four pillars have been erected for early warning of disasters at Pakhimara Bazar and Nilgani Housing of Nilgani Union and Bablatla Bazar, Companygani Bazar of Baliatali Union, and flags have been hoisted.

Distribute emergency rescue equipment to Self-Help groups: Each set includes two megaphones, a radio one, five raincoats, five pairs of gumboots, a stretcher, five torch lights, and one kit bend; two such emergency rescue equipment are distributed. These are in Self-Help groups. The use of maintenance personnel has been taught. This will allow them to use it when needed.

Union level disaster risk assessment: CRA has been done in Baliatali and Nilganj Union. This report has been submitted to the Chairman of the concerned Union Parishad.

Actions in Corona: People of different professions were confined to the houses in Kalapara Upazila to avoid CORONA infection. In this situation, helpless, poor, and disabled people are especially in trouble. The source of income has stopped in this situation. People are confined to the house. The HHS with disabilities is at risk due to lack of food. Struggling to handle the situation seeks to reach out to beneficiaries at public and private levels. As a result, 44 persons with disabilities are covered under the ration card. Eight people were included in the list of 2500 Taka from the prime minister's relief fund. One person received 70 kg of rice as assistance to the fishermen. In addition, food items were provided to 50 families from SANGRAM and safety items, and food items were provided to 116 people in collaboration with CDD. In addition, through RIO (Rural Enhancement Organization) NGO10, disabled members received sanitizer, bucket, mug, wheel powder, Merrill soap, sanitary pad.

Steps of Dry Fish Processing instead of using chemicals

- Primarily Fish Collection and Cleaning: Fresh fish must be washed with pure water after collection. Rotten and low-quality fish should be isolated.
- 2. Sorting: Fish should be arouped species-wise, and groups must separate from each other.
- 3. Cleaning: Fish must be clean by scaling, separating intestinal substances, dressing partially cutting in need. Another small fish may remain in the intestine of large fishes; these are needed to clean out intestinal wastage.
- 4. Washing: Fish should be washed with pure water after dressing and hung for dewatering.

After completing the above steps following systems should be followed.

- Powdery mixing of turmeric and red chili powder: Turmeric-250 gm+chili-250 gm in 10 Ltrs. Pure water, fish sinking for 2-3 minutes.
- 2. Fish dryer system: Sunlight goes through transparent plastic, and fish dry speedily with internal heating. Flies, insects cannot enter through the plastic wall of the fish dryer.
- 3. Net and mulching system: Bamboo made mulching 30-40 feet in length and 3-4 feet height from a land surface covered by a mosquito net; fish can be dried quickly by protecting from flies, insects, dogs, and birds.

Mulch can be covered by polyethylene during

Children and adolescents are growing up within the four walls of family boundaries. Instead of organizing regular sports and club-organization in the neighborhood, they build groups on Facebook-Twitter-Viber. They spend their time in a different inconsistent world of their own making, as they do not participate in the field festival and are not involved in creative activities. They are becoming lonely due to a lack of association with people of different ages, including peers, for various reasons, including poor social system, risky environment, unsatisfied education system, and free family environment. Growing up in loneliness, they cannot cope easily with any stress, so they tend to make wrong decisions and rush to commit suicidal intension. This situation has become risky during the COVID-19 pandemic. Therefore, there is a need for this important generation of the country to adopt a program suitable for them to grow up well. In this context, PKSF has adopted the 'Program for Adolescents.'

Objective

Encouraging adolescents to develop a positive attitude towards social crime and degradation and develop a healthy lifestyle by acquiring moral qualities and achieving good health, adolescent physical and mental health, and awareness about safe food and nutrition.



Scope of the Program

Program for adolescents includes the development of moral values and social awareness: Adolescence and health awareness: Hygiene, food, and nutrition awareness; Various activities are being implemented in these four leadership development. areas development, cultural and sports activities. In addition, various measures have been taken under the program to prevent multiple social degradation and unwanted activities.

Target Population: 896 Adolescents.

Working Places: 24 villages of Barguna district (Barguna Sadar, Patharghata, Bamna upazila).

Human resources: Program organizer-2

Working Procedure: Initiatives have been taken to form a club surveying by selecting a community of adequate adolescents aged 10-19 years. Meetings with teenagers and their parents have been organized to exchange views on the club formation's goals, objectives, and expected outcomes and their opinions on its formation. After that, an 11-member committee was formed with through meetings teenagers adolescents, and orientation was done. The name of the club, the venue, and the meeting date have been fixed, and an action plan for the year has planned. SANGRAM has provided equipment and supplies.

Implementation: Program for adolescents was started in August 2019 with 12 Adolescent Clubs, of which 5 of the UPP-Ujjibito projects and five organized. Later on, 12 more clubs were formed, and activities were started in 24 clubs. The members of these clubs are trained efficiently. providing orientation on club management. The club is made functional, providing necessary documents, registers, sports equipment, and other paraphernalia. The clubs hold four meetings a month every week. Weekly meetings are held in a colorful atmosphere. The Program Officer in charge of 2 meetings per month assists in conducting the meetings and enhances the knowledge through thematic discussions. In this way, the club members continue working to increase social awareness on various issues, including health. nutrition. environmental protection, and hygiene, and create interest in promoting norms and values. Although the club's activities were suspended for some time during

the COVID-19 pandemic, the clubs have established a strong base in the area by implementing two years of activities.

Furniture and Equipment: Adolescent Club has been provided with a steel cupboard to safely store equipment, tools, materials, and goods under the Adolescent Program. Adequate books have been provided for the library. Provided sports like football, volleyball, cricket ball, bat, stamp, rope jump, archery on the dartboard, ludo code, chess and carom board, etc. The social services provided include blood pressure measuring instrument, diabetes measuring instrument and strip, height measuring tape, growth chart, weight measuring instrument, thermometer, muac tape, etc. A folder has been provided for storing documents received in training and orientation for each member. Coronation security equipment has been provided.

Community-Based Initiatives: The members of the club work to create social awareness and interest in various issues, including health, nutrition, environmental protection, and hygiene among the common people of the area. Child marriage, in particular, has played a significant role in stopping it. As many as 16 child marriages have already been stopped through 32 clubs, or the marriages have been canceled, informing the concerned authorities. Community-based health initiatives measure blood pressure, check diabetes, measure weight, and determine the blood group. In 2021, adolescents checked the diabetes of 1446 people (one more than once) through 32 clubs and helped 1224 group people through 11 clubs. Four hundred eleven people

were helped for CORONA vaccine registration. Each club has organized sports and cultural events.

Planting of Fruits, Herbs, and Ornamental trees: Planted 160 fruit trees through 32 clubs, and initiatives were taken for advising teenagers. Each of the club members has planted 18 medicinal plants. According to the decision of the club member meeting, each member has planted the required number of ornamental trees in the gateway of their homes.

The initiative of club members during CORONA Pandemic: The youth involved in the Barguna Adolescent Club under the Adolescent Program has stood by the helpless and financially impoverished people during the CORONA Crisis to the best of their ability. Clothing masks have been made for 600 people through 32 clubs. Thirty-two meetings were organized among 1200 people, including members and guardians of 32 clubs, to discuss preventive measures. Later, the leading members of the Adolescents' Club launched a door-to-door campaign to circulate accurate information about CORONA to save the community from rumors and panic.

Sheikh Rasel Day Celebration: Sheikh Rasel's Birthday Discussion Meetings at 24 Adolescent Clubs in collaboration with PKSF under Program for Adolescents with the theme 'Indomitable Confidence'. At the Safipur Adolescent and Adolescent Joint Club of Bamna Upazila, a discussion meeting was held on 18th October at 10 pm. Adolescent Club members have discussion meetings on Sheikh Rasel's biography, quiz competitions, and reading sessions.

All of us are more or less involved in confronting the COVID-19 pandemic through awareness-raising and vaccination to form a safe life. SANGRAM has been working since 6 January 1985 to develop the livelihood development of marginal people. The organization performed massive activities for vulnerable people in the COVID-19 crisis.



Low-income people were in more danger due to blocking all types of IGAs. Especially women-headed families, families with disabled people, rickshaw pullers, auto drivers, ferrymen, tea staler, hotel boys, day laborers, blacksmiths, and carpenters used to face crucial days of their lives. Savings is too scanty of amount more over the HHs do not have any more alternative of income. SANGRAM has taken different types of steps for the safety of coastal dwellers.

SANGRAM contribution to the District Administration: Many people were confined to their houses during the COVID-19 pandemic and to spend miserable lives. used Administration helped these people during the lockdown situation. SANGRAM donated Tk. 175000.00 in DC fund. Moreover, the organization donated Tk. 1,10,801.00 to the honorable Prime Minister Relief Fund through Palli Karma-Sahayak Foundation(PKSF).

Food Assistance

- 1. The sea surrounds a substantial part of the Patharghata Sadar union. A considerable number of fishing laborers live in this union. They were being confined to their houses due to the COVID-19 pandemic. On the other hand, they became too handicapped due to frequent embargo on marine fishing. SANGRAM provided food packages to 400 destitute families that contained rice, dal, potato, and hand sanitizers in each packet.
- 1. Many people of Patharghata Pouroshova are the dwellers of the embankment of the Bishkhali River. Most of them are day laborers, tea staler, hotel workers, rickshaw pullers, and construction laborers. All sources of income became blocked due to the COVID-19 pandemic. SANGRAM provided food assistance to the 850 families of these

deserted households.

- Waterway communication by engine boat is one of the most important communications of Patharghata, Amtali, and Taltali Upazila with Barguna district town. A vast number of people led their livelihood depending on river crossing communication. They have fallen into crises owing to the COVID-19 pandemic situation. One hundred thirty-five families were served with 10 days of food support from SANGRAM.
- 1. Kakchira and Rayhanpur are the most important GCs in the Barguna district. One small river port is located in Kakchira GC and connects Rayhanpur GC. Many laborers depend on the Kakchira river port for their daily income. Some day laborers, tea staler, hotel workers, rickshaw pullers, and Kakchira and Rayhanpur GC construction laborers. All sources of revenue became blocked due to the COVID-19 pandemic. SANGRAM provided food assistance to the 650 families of these vulnerable and families that have a person with a disability.
- I. SANGRAM has been implementing one project named Life Style Development of Geriatric People in Patharghata and Bamna Upazila of Barguna district under funding assistance of PKSF. COVID-19 pandemic has increased the vulnerability of geriatric people to a miserable extent. SANGRAM provided service to the 415 families of aged persons.
- Disabled peoples are commonly helpless and neglected in our society. SANGRAM has been implementing one project, PHRPBD in Kalapara Upazila of Patuakhali district, underfunding assistance of CDD. One hundred thirty-three disabled people with different types of physical challenges included in this project, of which 50 persons are suffered from sight, deaf, hearing, and mental disorder. COVID-19 pandemic has made the lives of above 50 people more vulnerable and disabled, leading their life and livelihood. SANGRAM provided food packages for 10 days to above 50 disabled families door to door. Afterward, the organization assisted with the help of partner agency CDD to the 183 disabled families that contained rice, dal, potato, salt, onion, flattened rice, hand gloves, masks, and hand

sanitizers in each packet.

Awareness Raising Activities with the PWD members:

SANGRAM continued awareness-raising activities to the 129 disabled people on COVID-19 protocol with the funding assistance of the Center for Disability in Development (CDD) over the phone for three months to save their lives from COVID-19. Besides this, these disabled people were linked with government hospitals to provide health assistance where regular therapy was ensured.



Month-Long Sanitizing Personal Protection **Initiative:** SANGRAM implemented a month-long sanitizing and personal protection initiative in the Kakchira and Rayhanpur union of Patharghata Upazila with funding assistance from Oxfam BD. This activity was tenured from 9 May to 8 June 2020. Four hundred forty-eight families were included in the above two unions who were given one hygiene package that contained eight-wheel laundry soap, three-wheel powder packet, 3 Chaka Ball Soap, ten packet ORS, 20 Surgical Masks, and eight packet sanitary napkins. As a part of the community, sanitizing hand washing points were installed in different public points. Banners and festoons were hanged in public places, and miking from village to village occurred for COVID-19 protocol. Bleaching powder is sprayed in various Growth Centers and public areas with the assistance of UP Volunteers.

The initiative of ENRICH Program against COVID-19: ENRICH Program has been launching in Pathraghata Upazila since 10 January 2010, and after seven years, this program has extended in neighboring Bamna Upazila of the same district Barguna with the funding assistance of PKSF. In

this program, 5 Health officers and 27 health workers work with health. During the COVID-19 pandemic, these health workers provided health support to the beneficiaries door to door along with awareness-raising activities and distributed PPEs. They trained the beneficiaries to prepare TIPITAP and its uses. They helped people to go to the hospital for COVID Test. Awareness-raising message circulation at village level. Helped people with vaccine registration and took them to vaccination points. One hundred female teachers of this project also engaged in COVID-19 advocacy works and established linkage with the union and Upazila Parishad.

Voluntary works of Adolescents: Young people, both boys and girls of Barguna KISHOR-KISHORI Club, were always with helpless and financially handicapped families. They prepared soapy water and distributed it to 460 families through 15 adolescents club in Barguna Sadar Upazila. Prepared cotton musk and spread it to 800 people through 24 adolescents club. Twenty-four meetings were held with 1200 members about awareness-raising activities against COVID-19. Door-to-door campaigns were held against any rumor on COVID-19.

Initiatives within Farmers against COVID-19
Pandemic: Under the Value Chain project,
SANGRAM arranged awareness-raising
orientation on COVID-19 among 125 farmers
through 5 batches. Besides this, food insecurity
crises happened due to global COVID-19
Pandemic SANGRAM providing different
vegetable seeds like Gourd, Sweet Gourd, Long
Bean, Cucurbit, Puishak, Amaranthus, and
Kolmishak free of cost to the 600 farmers.

Many students from financially disadvantaged families are unable to acquire scholarships or other forms of financial aid from the government or other sources. As a result, they are unable to pursue further schooling. It is necessary to create a competitive atmosphere among rural students to increase the number of students pursuing higher education and the rate of education. They will become self-sufficient due to their education, and the number of unemployed people will diminish. SANGRAM has been awarding scholarships with the help of the Palli Karma-Sahayak Foundation (PKSF) to the students of its recipients since 2012.

Selection Methods

Children of the beneficiaries who achieved GPA 5 in SSC and HSC examinations and did not receive assistance from other sources are identified for scholarships. Socioeconomic vulnerability is considered a selection criterion because everyone cannot entertain for a scholarship. Finally, selected candidates are asked to open a bank account against their name, and the amount of the money of scholarships is paid through an account payee cheque. Providing support remains up to a second time based on their performance.

Eye Care and Treatment



Disabilities of the eyes can be reduced if they can be treated early on, for example, cataract surgery or treatment. Vitamin-A can protect you against night blindness. Cornea transplantation can save a person's vision. Blindness has a significant impact on rural populations due to a lack of awareness. Someone's visual sight could be permanently lost without initial initiative. SANGRAM is looking towards the community in eye care, particularly for the elderly. 90percent of the total of people with blindness live in underdeveloped nations. Most individuals in rural areas are unaware that eye therapy is neither difficult nor expensive but relatively simple and close to their homes. The following is a summary of the organization's eye care assistance:

Name of the Project: Free of cost Eye Treatment Project

Implementing partner: IspahaniIslamia Eye Institute and Hospital.

Commencement of the Project: 1 January 2012.

Objective: To support eye care and treatment free of cost to the eye patients of southern coastal community.

Target people: Eye patients of SANGRAM catchments area.

Methods: Arrange eye camp in collaboration with Islamia Eye Hospital. NGO collects and gathers eye patients in one place. The doctors and support staff IspahaniIslamia Eye Hospital provides treatment, suggestions, relevant medicines free of cost and arranges operations in their hospital at Barisal.

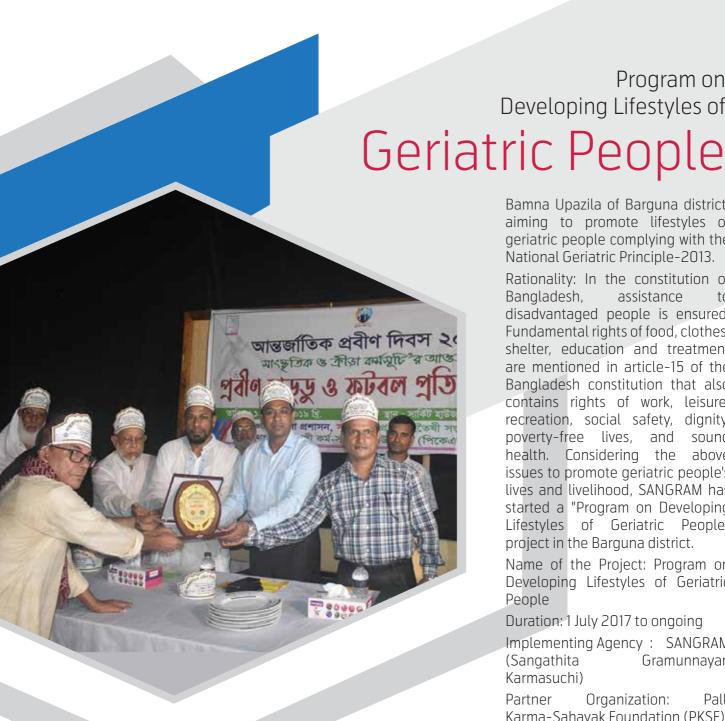
Working area: SANGRAM's catchment area (6 districts of Barisal division).

Housing for The Poor



One of the most crucial components of every person of Bangladesh's three basic needs is housing or shelter. Food, clothing, and shelter are the three most fundamental requirements. Approximately 17% of the overall population is still living under the extreme poverty threshold, and most people do not have a minimal sheltering status of three concerns. Regardless of gender, race, or color in its area, any nation will have to achieve or fill the concerns mentioned earlier to fulfill the Millennium Development Goal (MDG) and, after that, the Sustainable Development Goal (SDG). Making the issue a priority, the Bangladeshi government has already begun to address the housing scarcity among the ultra-poor with the help of non-governmental organizations (NGOs). As part of the Bangladesh government's critical issue, Sangram has begun housing initiatives in its working region, prioritizing Patuakhali, Barguna, Perojpur, and

Cyclone AMPHAN Early Recovery Project

Barguna and Patuakhali districts are the most vulnerable districts of Bangladesh in terms of disaster and climate change. It is located beside the Bay of Bengal and many mighty rivers. These areas have been severely affected by cyclone AMPHAN

which struck on 21 May 2020. The influence of cyclone AMPHAN, the most affected Upazilas are Amtali, Barguna Sadar and Pathorgata of Barguna district and Kalapara Upazila of Patuakhali district. The 82 villages of these areas have been flooded by tidal surges damaging embankment and shelter, crops, including Paddy and winter vegetables, poultry-livestock, livelihood, and sanitation options have been damaged severely.

Notably, woman-headed families and families with disabled and old age persons are more vulnerable.

As soon as the cyclone ceased, government and NGO personnel went to the affected, most vulnerable areas to observe the situation. While visiting, it was found that trees, bamboo, banana trees near highways were uprooted and broken, and the road communications were disrupted. A good number of the dwelling thatched houses were fully damaged, and some tin shed houses were roofed off (partially damaged). A few educational institutions like schools and madrasa were partially and fully





damaged. Crops have been severely damaged, and all the fields are submerged under logged rainwater. Betel leaf's grooves have been fully damaged. During this period, aman paddy, vegetables are fully or partially lost due to cyclonic wind and waterlogging caused by excessive rain. Fish farming ponds are overflowed with rainwater, and many people have lost their aquaculture species. While visiting the cyclone shelter, people were seen to leave the place with their cattle. But no significant number of livestock was lost.

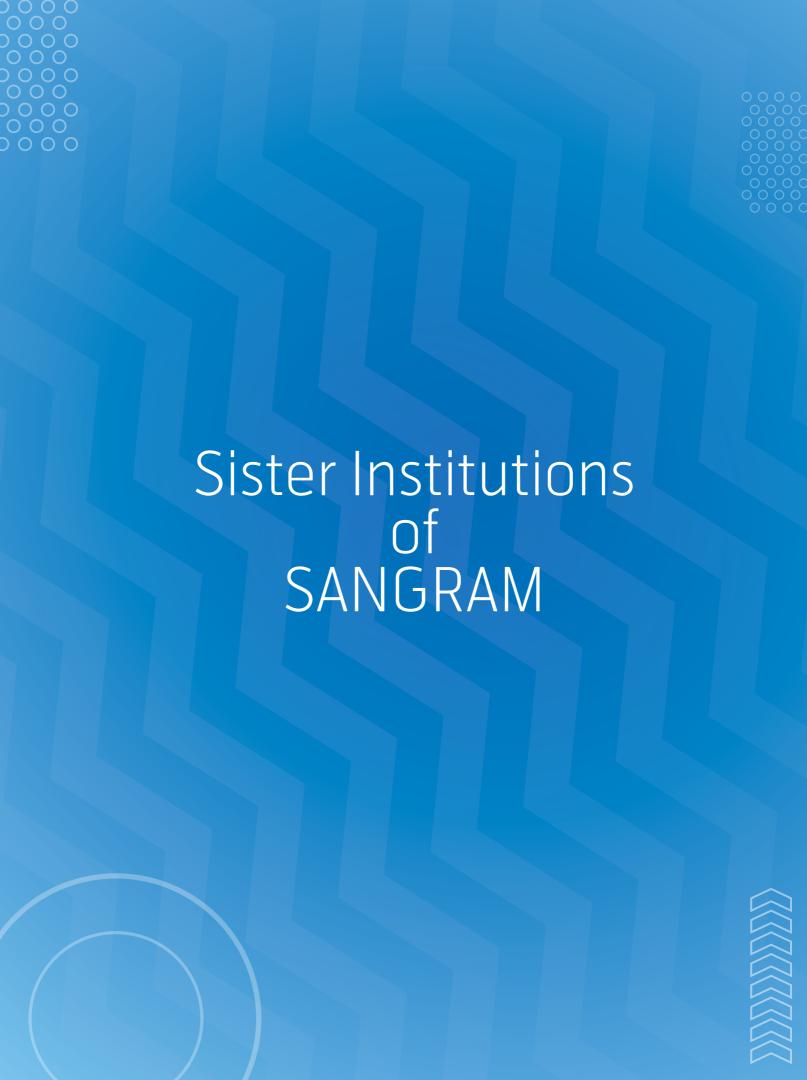

Socio-economic development is the core program of this grassroots organization whose main activity is institutional development through savings and credit management emphasizing different income-generating activities of enrolled beneficiaries. The organization has been working with this activity since 1989, forming groups with the association of socially deprived, back footed,

distressed, illiterate men and women. The program's objective is to improve socio-economic conditions, the status of Income Generating Activities (IGAs) of the concerned peoples. The groups are involved in a credit program comprised of 25-30 members, and male-female is in separate groups headed by two group leaders with the designation of President and Secretary. The groups are popularly termed as Samity.

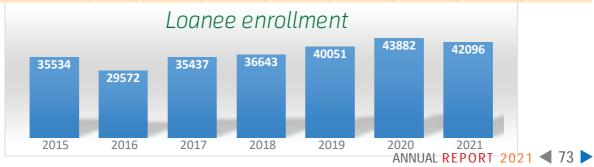

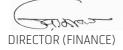

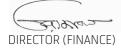
